What is the BRIDGES Leadership Camp?

The BRIDGES Youth Leadership Camp is an intense, weeklong camp that brings together youth from diverse backgrounds to develop their leadership, facilitation, youth organizing and human relations knowledge and skills. At BRIDGES Camp students learned how to organize their peers to take a stand against hate and violence and to combat prejudice while participating in fun hands-on activities, multi-media presentations, role playing and skill-building activities.

Who attended Summer Camp?

Sixteen students from across Orange County joined in and became part of camp. Camp attendees are asked to contribute \$250 towards the cost. However, this summer 80% of the students were from low-income families, therefore they were provided partial to full scholarships. Graduates of the camp are invited to participate in OC Human Relations' year-long youth internship program, OC Human Relations Youth Ambassadors.

Camp Overview

Monday, July 11

Day 1 - Community Building

Students were welcomed to camp by BRIDGES staff. Introductions were made and students were walked through the camp goals, objectives and community guidelines, as well as values they all wanted to follow for that week. Throughout the rest of the day students began a conversation about social justice issues and participated in a series of ice breakers that allowed them to become comfortable with each other. In turn, this created the foundation for them to interact with each other and express themselves throughout them rest of the week.

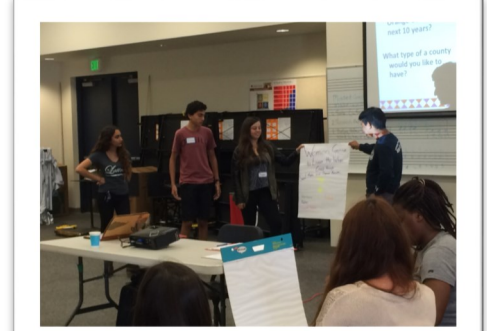
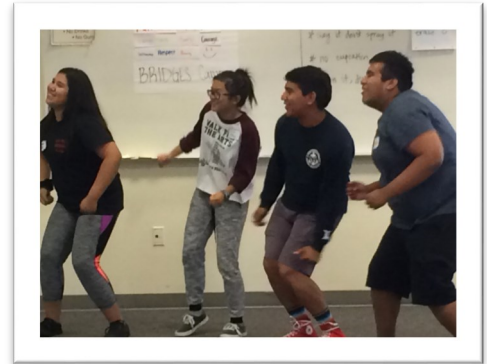
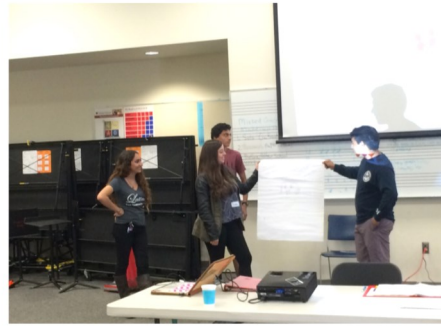


Tuesday, July 12

Day 2 - Identity and Social Consciousness

The day began with a community building circle where students shared personal stories that helped them bond together. Afterwards they learned about Orange County's history and injustices that have occurred throughout the years. Through different activities such as "Identity Corners" and "Horatio Alger," students were able to understand and further explore their identities. The day ended with a presentation about "School-to-Prison-Pipeline and School-to-Deportation-Pipeline" by Dr. Quaylan Allan from Chapman University.

Students finished the day by Participating in interactive community building activities.

Day 4 - Facilitation

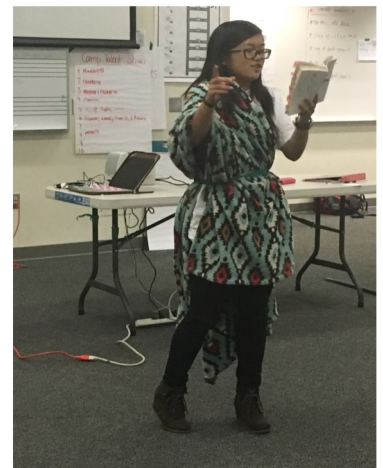
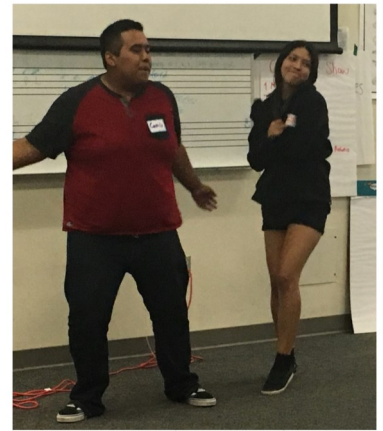
